U. S. Civil Service Explains "Photograph Rule" for Indentifying Competitors

Washington, Aug. 3 (ANP)-In response to several questions submitted by The Associated Negro Press during a recent call upon the U. S. Civil Service Commission, that body this week issued a statement relative to the subject matter embodied in ANP queries .

It had been discovered that there was no law compelling submission of a phetograph in connection with governmental civil service examinations. It is a rule which the Civil Service Commissioners set up themselves. The Commission was requested to set forth in writing, its views of the photograph requirement and its authority for not directing that the person receiving the highest mark in an examination be given the first appointment.

U. S. Civil Service Commissioners are the following: Harry B. Mitchell president, Lucille Foster McMillin and Samuel H. Ordway, Jr. Lawson A. Moyer is executive director and chief examiner. The Commission's statement to ANP, over signatures of William C. PUBLISH LIST OF ILLINO'S WPA EMPLOYES GETTING \$1,206 AND UP A YEAR

Chicago, Aug. 3 (ANP)-Local political leaders of both parties last Friday scaned with interest a list, printed in a morning newspaper, namming all Illinois WPA employes receiving a salary of \$1,200 or more a year.

A cursory examination of the 4column list printed in the Chicago-Tribune failed to reveal the names of any colored employes among the 1,000 WPA-ers in the upper income brackets. The names were obtained through efforts of Congressman Leo E. Allen (Rep., Ill.) ranking member of the house rules committee.

Representative Allen said the list shows the existence of a powerful political machinee founded on work relief funds in Illinois. and also shows the need for pas-

2 cups sifted cake flour; 2 teaspoons double-acting baking pow-1/2 teaspoon salt; 4 tablespoons butter or other shortening; cup milk; melted butter; 1 cup fresh blueberries; 4 tablespoons

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder, and salt, and sift again. Cut in shortening; add milk all at once and stir carefully until all flour is dampened; then stir vigorously until mixture forms a soft dough and follows spoon ly on floured board and knead 30 Roll in oblong sheet, 1/4 inch thick. Brush with melted butter; cover with blueberries and sprinkle with sugar. Roll as for jelly roll. Cut in 1-inch slices and place in lightly greased muffin pans. Brush tops with melted butter and sprinkle with additional sugar. Bake in hot oven (425° F.) 20 minutes, or until done. Makes 12 roulettes.
