## CITY WORKERS & THE FARMERS TRYING TO GET TOGETHER

Chicago, Aug. 24—Advocating closer cooperation between farmers and city workers for the benefit of both, Edward A. O'Neal, president of the American Farm Bureau Federation, last week told the fifteenth annual session of the American Institute of Cooperation.

"Farming people should stand right by labor in demanding that industry give security to workers."

O'Neal made this remark in reply to a suggestion by a Packinghouse Workers Organizing Committee official that the farmer's income would be markedly increased if the city worker were to receive enough pay to enable him to purchase sufficient agricultural products. The average annual income of a packinghouse worker in Chicago is far below the amount necessary to sustain a

family of four, he said, quoting U. S. Dept. of Labor figures.

O'Neal also made a plea for peaceful settlement of industrial disputes and recommended, in particular, that Armour and C., and the PWOC settle their current dispute around the conference table.

A national policy convention of the PWOC met in Chicago July 16, with 865 instructed delegates representing the union's 81,000 members in attendance. These delegates empowered their national officers to call a strike in Armour and other packing companies because of the packers' repeated refusal, according to union officials, to meet with the PWOC to negotiate a contract.
