

1 or 2 egg yolks; 4 cups milk; 1/3 cup quick-cooking tapioca; 1/4 cup sugar; 1/4 teaspoon salt; 1 or 2 egg whites; 1 teaspoon vanilla; 1/3 to 1/2 cup diced preserved or crystallized ginger; 1/3 cup cream, whipped; nut meats, coarsely

Mix egg yolk with small amount of milk in top of double boiler. and salt. Place over rapidly boiling water and cook 10 to 12 minutes into egg white. Cool - mixture serving 2 tablespoons ginger for garnish. Chill. Fold in cream. Serve in sherbet glasses. Garnish with additional whipped cream, and sprinkle with ginger and nuts.




