

**DR. CARVER ADDRESSES  
NEW YORK FORUM**

**TELLS OF IMPORTANT ROLE  
PLAYED BY CHEMISTRY IN  
WAR AND PEACE**

**AWARDED T. ROOSEVELT  
"FOR DISTINGUISHED SER-  
VICE IN THE FIELD OF  
SCIENCE"**

New York City, Nov. 9 (ANP)—A featured speaker on last Wednesday's session of the Herald-Tribune's Forum on Current Problems was Tuskegee Institute's famed Dr. George Washington Carver, scientist and chemist, who discussed the part played by chemistry in warfare and in peace.

Dr. Carver's appearance as forum speaker was a prelude to the more formal occasion last Friday night when the noted chemist was awarded the Theodore Roosevelt medal "for distinguished service in the field of Science." The presentation was made following a dinner at Roosevelt House on East 20th street and presided for the impressive ceremony were Dr. Frederick D. Patterson, president of Tuskegee and Dr. Wm. Jay Schieffelin, chairman of Tuskegee's board of trustees and Dr. A. W. Curtis, Jr., assistant to Professor Carver.

Co-speaker with Dr. Carver on the forum program was Col. Adelpo Gibson, chemical warfare officer of the United States Army 2nd Corps Area. Dr. Carver told his hearers that the present European conflict would develop new needs of humanity which research chemists would try to solve when peace came again. Declaring that the research chemist will be a great factor in future world development, Dr. Carver said:

"I believe that America is on the eve of the greatest scientific development it has ever known, and destined to become a leader along many lines of practical endeavor heretofore unnoticed. The chemist will no longer be satisfied to become a mere analyst, often going over the same thing day after day. The ideal chemist of the future will be an investigator, one who dares to think and work with an independent freedom not permissible heretofore unfolding before our eyes a veritable mystic maze of new and useful products, from material almost or quite beneath our feet and now considered of little or no value.

"The Southern section of the United States will probably become the greatest beneficiary of this research, on account of its vast and varied storehouse of undeveloped riches along many lines. We really know so little of those fields although they hold the golden keys of a happy and successful life, bubbling over with one joyous thrill after another as chemical and physical discoveries draw back the curtain on new wonders before our astonished gaze."


**ONLY TWO SHILLINGS**

If she goes to him she says he will help her, but it costs about five shillings for transportation to this "city of gold" and back. However, we must not forget to tell you that this husband's job pays him the magnificent wage of twelve shillings (a little less than three dollars) per month.
