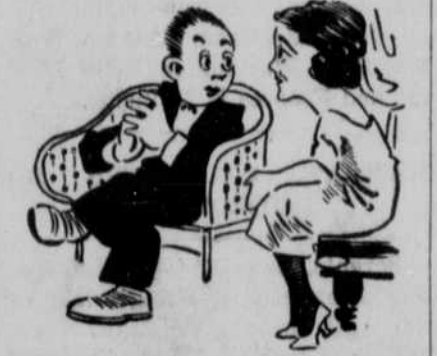

Calvin's Newspaper Service TESTED RECIPE By Frances Lee Barton WHEN Junior's lips break into smiles and Dad's eyes are a gleam; when Ruth and Grace squirm with delight, I'm serving Bagdad Cream. The children's plates are magic rugs. The Caliph's wand, a spoon. While "seconds please" calls for "seconds" at meal time — night or noon. Bagdad Cream 1 package orange-flavored gelatin; 1 1/2 cups hot water 1/2 cup prune juice; dash of salt; 1/2 cup heavy cream; 1 cup cooked prune pulp; 1/2 cup canned crushed pineapple. Dissolve gelatin in hot water. Add prune juice and salt. Chill until cold and syrupy. Fold in cream, whipped only until thick and shiny, but not stiff. Fold in prune pulp and pineapple. Chill until slightly thickened. Turn into mold. Chill until firm. Unmold. Serve with whipped cream. Serves 6.

I'll Take Pudding! By Frances Lee Barton A good recipe makes a good pudding. A good pudding makes a good dessert. A good dessert is a good finish to a good meal. Here is your good recipe. The rest is up to you! Chocolate Masquerade Pudding 2 squares unsweetened chocolate; 3 cups of milk; 1/4 cup sugar; 4 tablespoons cornstarch; 1/2 teaspoon salt; 2 egg yolks, slightly beaten; 1 teaspoon vanilla; 2 egg whites; 4 tablespoons sugar; 1/2 cup shredded coconut. Add chocolate to milk and heat in double boiler. When chocolate is melted, beat with rotary egg beater until blended. Combine sugar, cornstarch, and salt; add small amount of chocolate mixture, stirring until smooth; return to double boiler and cook until thickened, stirring constantly. Then continue cooking 10 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add small amount of mixture to egg yolks, stirring vigorously; return to double boiler and cook 2 minutes longer, stirring constantly. Add vanilla and turn into greased baking dish. Beat egg whites until foamy throughout; add sugar, 2 tablespoons at a time, beating after each addition until sugar is blended. Then continue beating until mixture will stand in peaks. Pile lightly on chocolate mixture and sprinkle with coconut. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) 15 minutes, or until delicately browned. Serves 6.
