## WHITE DOCTORS TO TALK

Houston, July 6 (ANP) While events in other parts of the world bring into relief the necessity for cooperation between the citizens of America in the performing of all functions affecting the general welfare, it is announced that the 46th annual session of the National Medical Association will feature addresses by two leading white Texas physicians on subjects relating to a general conference theme of "Cooperation between physicians of the two races".

Meeting in the heart of the deep South, Houston, August 12 to 16 inclusive, physicians from over all of the United States will hear Dr. Hlman Taylor, secretary of the Texas State Medical Association, white, and Dr. E. W. Bertner, of Houston representing the American Medical Association in liberal discussion of steps to bring the physicians of the two races together in working out the problems raised by disease, pestilence and death.

Keynote talks on the general 1940 theme of cooperation will be heard from Negro doctors who will bring concrete suggestions regarding efforts to achieve further unity between practitioners, particularly in sections where discriminatory customs make such helpful cooperation extremely difficult.

In attendance at the meeting of the American Medical Association meeting in New York City last week was AMA's executive secretary John T. Givens, of Norfolk, who discussed with leaders of the NMA on this matter. While in New York, Dr. Givens made arrangements with exhibitors of scientific and medical products to set up booths at the NMA meeting in Houston in August.

The addresses by the white Texas doctors were arranged by Dr. Thelma Patton Laws of Houston, active leader in local medical circles and chairman of the committee handling the entertainment of the national meeting for the Lone Star State Medical, Dental and Pharmaceutical association, host to the convention.

Dr. Givens pointed out this week that through the conscientious efforts of the National Medical association committee on recognition of Negro physicians by the AMA, great strides have been made in behalf of colored doctors and the way paved for some constructive discussion of cooperation between the races as will feature the 1940 session.

## DARK HUMOR



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When the temperature is near the hundred mark it is difficult to concentrate on anything more strenuous than our next trip to the water fountain, and we are inclined to slap our lipstick on haphazardly, dust our faces with rouge and powder and hope that perspiration won't wipe out our work too soon. **Apply Make-Up Sparingly**

Powder, if applied too heavily, will cake when the first drops of perspiration appear, giving a flour and water paste effect. Rouge, unless precaution is taken, will smear and stand out in great blobs on the cheeks. It is better to use no make-up at all than to use it carelessly these hot days. Cleanliness, as I stated in my last column, is the first requisite of beauty. Wash your face frequently during the summer. Never apply new make-up over the old spotty powder. Take a few extra minutes with soap and water and then start all over again.

**Blend Cosmetics to Skin Tone**  
Remember that whether you are actually burned from going out in the sun or not, your face takes on a darker hue in summer from the heat and glare. Don't attempt to use the same shades of make-up that you have been using during the winter. A powder too light for

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Your skin tone, streaked with heat and perspiration, will give you a freakish look. A softer shade of rouge and lipstick, too, is important to your summer make-up kit. Get a shade that will blend with your pastel dresses and the darker tint of your skin.

If you do go out in the sun, you will probably need to change the shade of your make-up gradually as your skin takes on darker tints. It is sometimes wise, during this in-between period, to have several boxes of powder in different shades which you can blend yourself to get the shade you need at the moment.

And don't forget to keep your hair immaculately clean during the very hot weather. Choose a hairdress that is simple and easily rearranged so that you won't put off your shampoo too long.

Your daily bath is of utmost importance these days. Plenty of soap and water is more important than any number of beauty treatments and a great deal more satisfying. The secret of summer beauty lies in looking clean and natural—a simple hair-do, carefully blended, light-colored make-up, and lots and lots of water.
