Two nurses and four employees comprise the staff caring for these others, who range from 13 to 24 years old, and their infants.

The average stay of the mothers in the hospital is three and one half to four months. Girls who are physically able help with the housework and are taught to sew and do other useful things. They also take care of their babies under supervision of a nurse.
