Clinton Clark, Negro organizer of the Louisiana Farmers' Union, has been thwarted, the National Federation for Constitutional Liberties announced here this week. Clark, who was threatened with lynching after his arrest in Natchitoches Parish July 27, has been released and given safe conduct across the border to Texas. Ten charges were placed against him alleging that he had collected funds for the union under false pretenses. He was an accredited officer of the union and empowered to collect dues for the union. Officials of the union declared that Clark's record was clear and that

the real reason for his arrest was that he had been successful in organizing the impoverished farmers of Natchitoches Parish. Protest To Justice Dept. Answering an appeal from the Louisiana Farmers' Union for aid, the National Federation for Constitutional Liberties sent two delegates to the Civil Liberties Unit of the Department of Justice, together with representatives of the National Negro Congress and the Southern Negro Youth Congress. The delegation requested that the department take steps to secure Clark's release and to assure him safe conduct out of Natchitoches Parish.

The Federation was informed the next day of a report from the Attorney General's office in Louisiana that Clark had been released on personal bond and taken safely to Texas.

Upon hearing of Clark's release the Federation declared that its "success in this case is new evidence of the value of an organization which can coordinate the activities of farm, church, labor, racial fraternal and civic groups in defense of civil liberties in the United States."

The release of Clark is regarded as a tremendous victory not only for the farmers of Louisiana but for farmers throughout the South who are now being subjected to an unprecedented wave of violence and intimidation.

**WHITE SLAYER OF NEGRO SOUGHT**

Columbia, S. C., Sept. 12 (ANP) A \$100 reward was posted here last week for the capture of a white man wanted for the slaying of Frank Alexander, a taxicab driver of Camden.

Alexander was shot to death last Thursday night and his body dragged into a cornfield 10 miles from Camden. The taxi then was driven toward Sumter highway where it was abandoned because of engine trouble.

Sheriff McLeod said the slayer was thought to be a white man between 25 and 30 years of age, with a slight figure and shallow complexion. Armed with a .32 pistol, he was wearing dark trousers and a white shirt when last seen, the sheriff said.

**5th Column Muscling Way Into Football Rank**

Omaha, Nebr., Sept. 21 (Special) —The "fifth column" is muscling its way even into the college football ranks.

The group will be composed of Creighton alumni who have signified their intention of seeing the battle. **PUSHKIN'S GRAND-SON DIES IN RUSSIA**

Moscow, Sept. 19 (ANP) —Gregori Pushkin, grandson of the celebrated Russian poet, died here last week at the age of 71. Descended from a noted African soldier, Abraham Hannibal, Pushkin also had a brilliant military career, serving actively in the first World War and later after the Russian Revolution as communications' officer in the Red Army. Most recently he had worked in the manuscript department of the Lenin Library in Moscow.
