This was a finding of the Committee on Youth Outside the Home and School of a White House Conference on Child Health and Protection several years ago.

The Boy Scouts of America, which sponsors "Boys' Life Week" from Dec. 1 to Dec. 7, recognizes that reading occupies a large share of a boy's leisure time and therefore gives much attention to this activity.

Scout leaders recognize that boys obtain much of their viewpoint toward life through reading and the Movement directs its influence to the end that Boy Scouts should find their reading habits profitable.

A leading tool in the Scout Movement's efforts for better reading is "Boys' Life," the monthly magazine it has published since 1912 as a non-commercial enterprise. Designed to meet the interests of growing boys and to give them wholesome reading material the magazine has enjoyed the cooperation of some of the nation's leading writers and artists.
