NO NEGROES ON LOCAL DRAFT BOARDS IN MANY STATES, PRELIMINARY SURVEY DISCLOSES (continued from page 1)

ed on registration boards and in many cases whites refused to come in to be questioned by Negroes.

Jobs Are Few
Fourteen Negroes are receiving employment on draft boards in Detroit, Michigan: 1 in Youngstown, O.; 12 in Washington, D. C.; 3 in Providence, R. I.; 3 in Buffalo, N. Y.; 50 in New York, N. Y. and Kent, Ohio, reported some employed but did not know how many. Florence, S. C., Amelia Court House, Va.; Danville, Va.; Dallas, Texas; Thornhill, Va.; Princeton, N. J.; St. Louis, Mo.; Monrovia, Calif.; Durham, N. C.; Oklahoma City, Okla.; Albuquerque, N. M.; Minneapolis, Minn.; Warren, Ark.; Newark, N. J.; Aiken, S. C.; Kansas City, Mo.; Berkeley, Calif.; and Wilmington, Del. all reported there were no Negroes hired in their locality for work on draft boards.

Negro physicians were placed on boards in Detroit, Mich.; Princeton, N. J.; St. Louis, Mo.; Bell County, Kentucky; Durham, N. C.; Minneapolis, Minn.; Newark, N. J.; Providence, R. I.; New York, N. Y.; Berkeley, Calif.; Kansas City, Mo.; Washington, D. C.; and Mexico, Mo. In Aiken, S. C., and Wilmington, Del., there are Negro physicians serving as associate examiners. Oklahoma City, Okla., reports there are Negro physicians who examine Negroes only. South Carolina Adopts New Plan

Adopting a plan that does not coincide with the plan of advisory boards in other states, Governor Burnet R. Maybank of South Carolina, has appointed 128 Negroes to serve as members of advisory boards throughout the state. The power of these persons is limited to aiding Negro registrants in filling out application blanks etc., and does not include the power to review cases as is true of members on advisory boards in other states.

The balance of summarized information on advisory boards in various states received by the association up to date follows:

There are 12 Negroes on advisory boards in Detroit, Mich.; 3 in Youngstown, O.; 3 in Florence, S. C.; 2 in Amelia Court House, Va.; 6 in Washington, D. C.; 5 in Long Branch, N. J.; 1 in Danville, Va.; 3 in Princeton, N. J.; 3 in Oklahoma City, Okla.; 6 in Newark, N. J.; 3 in Providence, R. I.; 1 in Buffalo, N. Y.; 12 in New York, N. Y.; 1 in Berkeley, Calif.; and 1 in Wilmington, Del. Dallas, Texas. St. Louis, Mo.; and Durham, N. C., reported there were Negroes on the advisory draft boards but they did not know the exact number. There are no Negroes serving on advisory draft boards in Peekskill, N. Y.; Kent, O.; Thornhill, Va.; Bell County, Kentucky; Albuquerque, N. M.; Minneapolis, Minn.; Warren, Ark.; Kansas City, Mo.; and Mexico, Mo.

In St. Louis, three men refused to register. One of these refused because he had been turned down when he volunteered his services for the navy. The other two men, according to the NAA, CP, branch, did not understand the draft.

ALABAMAN GETS LIFE VERDICT IN SECOND TRIAL OF MURDER CASE THAT WENT TO U. S. SUPREME COURT

Montgomery, Dec. 18 (ANP) A murder case which for two years has attracted wide attention and which, on appeal, went to the U. S. Supreme court, was closed here last Wednesday in Judge Carter's Circuit court when a jury found Dave Canty guilty of the murder of Miss Eunice Ward, white, Montgomery health nurse and sentenced him to life imprisonment in the

State prison.

At the first trial in June, 1938, a jury decreed the death penalty but Canty's counsel secured a new trial on appeal to the Nation's highest tribunal. Under the Supreme Court's ruling, an alleged confession by Canty used at the first trial, was declared inadmissible at the second hearing, because it had been obtained by keeping the defendant in solitary confinement and by duress.

One of the State's star witnesses at the second trial was Mrs. Hattie Howard, aged colored woman fortune teller, who told of a visit made to her house by Canty shortly after the crime was committed two years ago, last March. Mrs. Howard said Canty admitted "hitting the big woman first," referring to the attack on Miss Ward and her sister, Lillian, in a thick-et near the Masonic home, as they were picking flowers. The state also introduced three boys, who identified Canty as the man they saw running from the thicket on the afternoon of the crime.

U. S. TO HOLD EXAMS FOR TRANSLATOR AND AUDITORS

Washington, D. C., Dec. 17 (ANP)—The United States Civil Service Commission has announced that the deadline dates for the filing of applications for the examination for Principal Translator have been extended to Dec. 30, 1940—Jan. 2, 1941. Optional subjects for this test will be Portuguese and Spanish.

Other exams announced by the commission: Accounting and Auditing Assistant, \$1,800 a year, application deadline dates, Dec. 30, 1940—Jan. 2, 1941, a nd Junior Warehouse Examiner, \$2,000 a year, application deadline, Jan. 6, Jan. 9, 1941. Full information may be obtained at local postoffices.

MEMPHIS GIVES ROARING WELCOME TO HANDY AT XMAS CHARITY VEELEBRAT'N

Memphis, Dec. 19 (ANP) Memphis' famous Beale Street was in gay, festive mood last week as it again extended a royal welcome to its favorite son—W. C. Handy, famous "Daddy of the Blues," who came here as the honored guest for the second annual Blues Bowl game in Booker T. Washington Stadium.

The football classic and celebration was staged by the local Elks Club and the proceeds will provide big Christmas baskets for needy colored families. Mayor Chandler headed a long list of celebrities of both races who were present to honor the 67 year old composer of the "Memphis" and "St. Louis Blues" and other swing tunes too numerous to mention.

About 10,000 persons crowded the line of March as the Mail Carriers Band, the Booker T. Washington Drum and Bugle Corps and the school band led the gay paraders down Beale Street to the Stadium. Sixteen pretty drum majorettes who pranced and cavorted to the snappy, swing music, drew salves of cheers, exceeded only by the warmth of the reception and greeting given Mr. Handy.

The noted Blues composer beamed with pleasure as the bands, after reaching the Stadium, marched around the field and a number of dancers did a tom tom dance in his honor. Nat Williams was the master of ceremonies.

BROTHERHOOD HOLDS LABOR CONFERENCE IN TEXAS

San Antonio, Texas.—Under the auspices of the San Antonio Division of the Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters and the L. A. S. Auxiliary, a Labor Conference was held extending from Dec. 1 to Dec. 5. It covered a wide range of vital, live and active question of housing and Negro participation in the building of the housing project for Negroes in San Antonio. The discussion of this subject was led by Mr. Clarence Johnson who is a field representative of the United States Housing Authority. This session was attended by several hundred

citizens who enthusiastically entered into the discussion of the right of Negro workers to share in the work provided by the building of this project on the basis of their citizenship as well as tax payers and qualifications as artists.

A. Philip Randolph, International President, and M. P. Webster, First International Vice President, made a special trip to San Antonio to take part in this conference following their stay in New Orleans in attendance at the A. F. of L. Convention.

The Conference was inter-racial. Mr. Williams, AF of L organizer in the southwest region and active in the San Antonio Central Trades and Labor Council; Dr. Hendricks head of the Department of Economics of the University of San Antonio; and Mr. Hensley, lawyer in San Antonio; spoke on Negro Labor and the Labor Movement; the Depression and the Negro Worker and the Negro, the Ballot, and Civil Liberties, respectively. All of these speakers are white. Their treatment of their subjects was on a high and liberal plane.

Mr. N. L. Flagg, president of the San Antonio Division and Mr. J. B. Caviness, secretary-treasurer were in charge of the Conference.
