# Calvin's Newspaper Service TESTED RECIPE

-By Frances Lee Barton-No matter whether the cherries have just been picked from your own favorite tree, or whether they come from



cherry - flavored desserts. All will be delighted with this dainty:

Cherry Rolls 2 cups pitted and drained red cherries, fresh or canned; ½ cup cherry juice; 1 cup sugar; 2 cups sifted cake flour; 2 teaspoons double-acting baking powder; ½ teaspoon salt; 4 tablespoons butter or other shortening; 2 cmp milk. or other shortening; 3/3 cup milk; 2 tablespoons melted butter.

Mix cherries, juice, and and let stand about 10 minutes; drain and reserve sweetened juice Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and salt, and sift again. Cut in shortening. Add milk all at once and stir carefully until all flour is dampened. Then stir vigorously until mixture forms a soft dough and follows spoon around bowl. Turn out immediately on floured board and knead 30 seconds; roll ¼ inch thick. Cover with cherries. Roll as for jelly roll. Moisten edge and press against roll. Cut in 11/2 inch slices. Place in greased pan, cut-side down; brush with butter and pour ½ cup sweetened cherry juice over slices. Bake in hot oven (425° F.) 30 minutes, basting at 10 minute intervals with remaining juice. Serve hot with whipped cream, if desired. Serves 6.
