The Gay Northeasterns, an exclusive social club composed of daughters of prominent negro families in Boston, New York, Philadelphia, Washington and Baltimore, has presented a movable library to the Tuskegee Infantile Paralysis Hospital at Tuskegee Institute, Alabama. The library can be wheeled to the bedside of patients and

the books are being selected by Director Morteza D. Sprague of the Tuskegee Institute library. The new hospital, where negro victims of the crippling disease are receiving every possible medical attention under the direction of the noted surgeon, Dr. John W. Chenault, was constructed and equipped at Tuskegee through funds granted by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.
