RANDOLPH, WHITE CONFER WITH FDR ON MARCH FOR JOBS

Washington, D. C.—As a result of the enthusiastic and mass support of the March on Washington for Jobs in National Defense, A. Phillip Randolph, director of the March and Walter White, NAACP Secretary were here Wednesday, June 18, to confer with President Roosevelt, Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson, Secretary of the Navy, Frank Knox, William S. Knudsen and Sidney Hillman of the Office of Production Management, Aubrey Williams, national administrator of the National Youth Administration, and Anna Rosenberg of the Social Security Board.

The government officials, Mr. Randolph and Mr. White had a

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long discussion about the place of the Negro in the entire national defense program, including industries, army, navy air forces, vocational training and job placement.
A second conference was held without the President in which Miss Layle Lane, a vice president of the American Federation of Teachers, and Frank R. Cross-waithe, labor union official, participated. They are members of the steering committee of the March on Washington.
