U. S. AND CITY OFFICIALS ACT ON RACE BAR IN N. J. HOUSING

Jersey City, N. J.—Following the telegrams sent by the NAACP to Nathan Straus, Administrator of the United States Housing Authority and to Mayor Frank Hague of this city, action has been promised by both officials to try to get colored families admitted to the new LaFayette Gardens housing project here.

Nathan Straus wired the NAACP: "U. S. Housing Authority will renew efforts to get local Housing Authority to reconsider present occupancy plans. To this end, we are making representations to the local Housing Authority and to city officials."

Hague's telegram stated that the matter had been taken with the Jersey City Housing Commission.

A delegation, headed by the Reverend E. S. Hardge, president of the Jersey City NAACP, visited the national office on October 7, and reported that occupancy was taking place at the LaFayette Gardens, but that colored families who had lived in the area for more than 30 years in harmony with whites were not being admitted. The effect of action by the U. S. Housing Authority and the mayor will be known shortly.

FORMER FT. BRAGG COMMANDANT NOW HEADS MISSISSIPPI ROTC

New York—Colonel Charles B. Elliott, former commander at Ft. Bragg and in charge at the time of the double killing there, has been given the post as head of the ROTC at the University of Mississippi, a virtual demotion, it was reported to the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People last week.

New Commander at Fort Bragg is Colonel E. P. Parker, Jr.

NAACP ANNUAL CONFERENCE CHANGED TO JULY 14 TO 19

New York—The date of the annual conference of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People to be held in Los Angeles, California, has been changed to July 14 to 19 from June 23 to 28 by vote of the branches, it was announced by the NAACP this week.

The Board of Directors of the Association voted approval of the change pending the action of the branches at its September meeting.

The July date was favored because it would allow many more persons to attend the California meeting. Plans are already underway to entertain a large delegation. It is expected that arrangements will be made for a special train out of Chicago.

NATIONAL ART WEEK AT TUSKEGEE TO FEATURE PAINTINGS OF DR. CARVER

Tuskegee, Oct. 14 (ANP)—National Art week, Nov. 17-23, will be celebrated at Tuskegee institute by the opening of the new art rooms in connection with the George Washington Carter museum.

Many choice paintings and rare pieces of intricate lace work, designed and created by the skillful fingers of Dr. Carver, will be exhibited to the public for the first time.

Artists and their friends are especially invited to see this rare collection of art in its many phases.
