DAY NURSERY RALLY

Recently, Urban League members of the American Women's Voluntary Services and interested representatives of civic and social

groups met to discuss the sponsoring of a day nursery. The committee has been promised by WPA that the nursery staff will be composed of Negroes and surplus supplies will also be supplied by

them. To meet the need for Child Care in the home of employed mothers due to defense efforts WPA will set up Child Development Centers upon the request of sponsors.

DO YOU KNOW?

1. It is the opinion of many different groups that there has been a great need for a day nursery in this community.

2. The present day nursery committee entreats your support and invites you to help make this project definitely a community project.

DO YOU KNOW:

that each child in the nursery will need:

one tooth brush, two towels, two wash cloths, one bib, one plate, one soup bowl, one sauce dish one glass or mug, one fork, one spoon.

All children share the story, books, small dining table and chairs and heavy play equipment.

The sponsoring committee supplies the surplus supplies to the extent required for a balanced diet.

The sponsoring committee seeks to raise \$100.00 in the next two weeks to insure the expense of equipping the nursery and to pay for extra food, laundry, cod liver oil, for three months. A small fee per child will help to pay for operating cost with the WPA assistance.

REQUESTS PUBLIC ASSIST AGAINST 'BLACK MARKETS'

Public opinion, if properly informed, will enforce price restrictions and regulations of rationing, Joseph D. Scholtz, regional director of Civilian Defense, predicted in Omaha today.

The Office of Price Administration recently asked butcher shops, retail meat dealers and other retail establishments not to raise prices above mid-March levels, Scholtz said. He also pointed out that the office of Price Administration has established regional enforcement offices in Omaha and other principal cities of the country to prosecute those who refuse to comply with price regulations and ration orders.

But the task of reporting price gouging and unwarranted hikes in the prices of commodities must depend upon the American public, he warned.

"We cannot have successful enforcement of price and rationing regulations unless citizens extend their full support," he said. "The government needs not only their personal compliance with regulations, but also their active assistance in exposing violators."

Public cooperation will accomplish the desired results.

We want no 'black markets' in this country...markets where the rich can buy rationed articles at excess prices and those with less money cannot afford to buy. The easiest way to keep this form of bootlegging out of the war is to nip it now. A few attempts have been made to start it. Our job as loyal citizens is to make it so unpopular and so unprofitable that no big scale operations will be ventured."

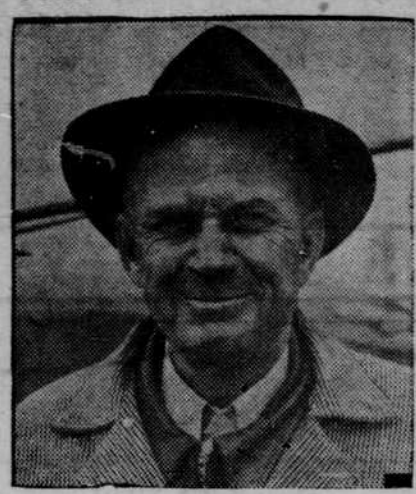

NATIONAL WILDLIFE WEEK

An America at war is an America aroused to the vital importance of timber, soil and water to furnish lumber, food, minerals and power—the sinews of war.

Thus, the fifth annual National Wildlife Restoration Week brings home the realization as never before that our resources must be guarded zealously for everything that conservationists have fought for and gained in the past generation are fitted somewhere in the war production picture.

The National Wildlife Federation, which for years has battled for restoration, is facing a grim fight now to guard against waste and spoilage of our resources.

Many of the sportsmen who purchased stamps in previous years are now in the armed services. It is the duty of those at home to carry on the conservation program so that when the boys return the fish and wildlife will be here for them to enjoy.

You can help in this fight by purchasing wildlife stamps and albums. Half the proceeds go to the national agency, half to the state group. Many sales in Nebraska will be made by direct mail, but if you were missed, you can do your part by sending your order to Ernie Bihler, President of the Nebraska Wildlife Federation 220 Lefflang Bldg, Omaha, Nebraska.

As chairman of the Nebraska Wildlife Federation, Mr. Bihler helps direct the efforts of the state group toward conservation aims. A single sheet of stamps, depicting 40 different species of American wildlife, sell for one dollar. A sheet of stamps plus an album and wildlife cover picture may be had for \$1.50.
