WHAT CAN WE DO? Omaha housewives who have been asking themselves, "What can I do to help win the war?" have found Armed with frying pan and skillet Armed with frying pans and killicks and led by the women's division of the Omaha Chamber of Commerce, they are mobilizing along the home front to save kitchen grease, which, through the manufacture of soap, and its by-product, glycerine, helps make munitions for the fighting forces.

Cooperating in the campaign are Omaha grocers, who are buying the grease from housewives and paying five cents a pound for it. Though hundreds of Omaha women are anxious to help in this effort to relieve the shortage of fats, they are asking for more detailed information. For instance—what kinds of grease are needed and how should it be prepared? The answer to the first question is, "Every kind of waste fat—bacon and sausage drippings, fat from roasts, steaks and chops, bits of left-over butter. Fish oil and other odors have no effect on the value of the grease." As for preparing the grease, two rules should be followed: (1) The grease should be free of food particles and moisture, and (2) it should be kept in clean, dry containers, preferably in the refrigerator. Grease should be strained through cheesecloth or a fine mesh sieve before it is stored. If mixed with meat juices, it should be allowed to cool; the fat will rise to the top, and, with a little care, can be easily removed. Scraps from steaks and chops can be rendered in the frying pan, the grease poured off and the bones thrown away. As for containers, grocers have asked that good-sized tin cans be used. The grocer will empty the containers, so that they can be used indefinitely. Glass jars and narrow topped receptacles are impractical. Then there is the question of rancid grease. Yes, rancid grease can

The less said about the outs, with a single exception, the better. VOTE FOR THE INS and continue Good Government, which we shall always strive to make better.


