




AXIS INVADES CORN CROP

TEACHERS WIN SALARY FIGHT chers of Marion county are jubil ant over their victory in the hard fought case with the Marion County School Board for equal pay. An order was handed down last Tuesday by Federal District Judge Louis W. Strum, restraining the board from paying the Negro teachers a smaller wage scale than that of the white teachers.

The order in part reads: "Order ed and adjudged that the defendant board of public instruction for Marion county, Floria, Broward Lovell superintendent of public instruction for said county, shall apply the amended salary schedule, adapted by said board on April 15, 1942, or any other method of rating teachers for salary purposes, adopted in lieu thereof to all teachers alike, both white and colored without discrim ination because of race or color


