#### NEGRO CARPENTERS GO TO WORK IN WASHINGTON

Twenty eight Negro carpenters Site war dormitory project in North east Washington last week, according to a report from William J. B. Fleming, Administrator of the Federal Works Agency. This fig. is being constructed by Samuel ure also represented the total num. Plato Negro contrator of Louisqualified up to that time for em ployment on union jobs by affiliating with the Local District Council

of Carpenters. The opening of these jobs to Negro carpenters has come at the insistence of General Fleming that there be no discrimination against projects constructed by the Federal Works Agency. In the past it had not been the practice of the Carpenter's District Council in Washington to permit the affiliation of Negroes and, as a result, Negro carpenters desiring to work under union conditions have been obliged to join a Baltimore local which qualified them for employment in the Baltimore jurisdiction.

Following conferences between District Council officials and labor representatives of FWA several nonths ago, it was agreed that available Negro carpenters would be employed on public works and war formitory construction. FWA reg ulations require that contractors pay Negro mechanics not less than 12 percent of their skilled payrolls in Washington and vicinity as evidence of non-discrimination on account of race.


