It's the labor policy of the plant to make no distinction as to race, creed or color. This means, according to Inland officials, that all employees have equal opportunities through promotional sequence schedules in keeping with the senjority of the plant. In other words, a man's service record and length of employment are the factors determ ining upward grading.

Although exact figures are not available, there are hundreds of Negroes holding down skilled, semiskilled and supervisory assignment at Inland, with the result that they draw the high wages commensurate with their classification






