New York, CNS) Muriel Rahn, sensational New York concert soprano, now appearing in the title role of Billy Rose's CARMEN JONES, will be seen on Broadway again this season. The talented, young artist who startled the opera and music world recently by learning and performing the difficult role in two weeks, was last seen along The Great White Way in the Alfred Lunt-Fontanne extravaganza "The Pirate." Each season Miss Rahn divides her time between concert and theatre.

A year ago last August, while rehearsing for "The Pirate," she took time out to go to Chicago and sing with the eighty-piece symphony orchestra at the famous Grant Park Shell, the first of her race to be so honored. Later in the season, she deserted Broadway and the Lunts for a concert tour that took her over five thousand miles. During the summer she became the first Negro concert soprano to appear at the renowned Water Gate Barge in Washington, DC, with the National Symphony Orchestra. This was followed by subsequent concerts at the Universities of Wisconsin, Purdue, Illinois and other national institutions of the mid-west.

A provision prohibiting discrimination has been included in all government contracts and subcontracts for war materials or services, and contractors are expected to abide by this provision in the same manner and with the same faithfulness as they abide by all other conditions.

Although preliminary consultations have revealed that a lesser number of war industries in Regions VI and VIII are refusing to employ members of various minority groups, a serious problem still exists since various minorities are not being used at their highest skills. Neither are they being accorded equal opportunities for training and promotion with other workers. This unfair practice has caused a severe wastage of manpower and skills to the detriment of the nation's total war production. A case in point seems to be the transportation industry both in this region and throughout the country. The numerous complaints received have necessitated the FEPC holding a special hearing on G's discrimination in employment on railroads which is now in progress in Washington, DC. Joseph B. Eastman, Director of the Office of Defense Transportation recently warned that unless drastic steps were taken to utilize all available labor, the country would be headed for a crisis in railroad manpower. Reports indicate that restrictions imposed upon Negro workers in the industry have been an important factor in causing the present critical situation about which Mr. Eastman spoke publicly. Local transportation employment falls in the same category according to FEPC officials.

AWAITS NAVY COMMISSION Atlanta, Nov. 21 (ANP) Joseph L. Pierce, son of Mrs. Geraldine L. Pierce of this city, is studying at Tufts college in Medford, Mass., in preparation for a commission under the navy training program, his mother disclosed here this week. In the roster of naval students published Nov. 10, he is rated as a member of V-12 in the engineering course. There are two Georgia boys among the 1,000 navy men stationed at the college, Pierce being the only Negro.
