The statement urged that extension of the Atlantic Charter principles "to all colonials and other exploited peoples, not only Europeans and Asiatics, but also Africans and peoples of African descent throughout the world," and called for "full participation by the United Stairs in establishing and maintaining such international machinery as may be necessary to establish a world order in which economic equality, political self-determination, and social justice will prevail."
