



"BILBO TALKED RACE BECAUSE HE FEARS DEMOCRACY ITSELF" SAYS KATHERINE SHRYER.

Mrs. Katherine Shryer, Executive Secretary of the National Committee to Abolish the Poll Tax, today, in an answer to Senator Bilbo's speech before the Mississippi Legislature on March 22, called upon the United States Senate to "reject the influence. of this vicious doctrine, to put its full weight behind the right of the majority, and pass the Anti-Poll Tax Bill." Mrs. Shryer's statement read, in full, as follows:

#### FEPC Savs It Has Finished RR Hearings

Washington, March 28 (ANP) The responsibilities of the FEPC in adjusting complaints against 14 of the original 22 railroads charged with discriminatory hiring policies have been fully discharged to the limit of the authority granted the committee by Executive Order 9346, and the cases are no longer before it.

This is the status explained in FE-PC's statement to the Smith committee last week in answer to counter charges filed by the group of southern carriers which have already balked at compliance with "cease and desist" directives issued against them, Chairman Malcolm Ross originally was to have appeared for questioning but was granted permission instead to file


