Duane T. Swanson

Duane T. Swanson is a candidate on the Republican ticket for re-election as a member of the Railway Commission. He was born in a small country town where his family still resides. He graduated from grade school and high school with honors. His family were poor, honest, hard-working people. After graduating from high school, he came to Omaha and went to work for the Burlington Railroad, where he worked for a number of years, studying traffic and other railroad matters. While there, he attended the University of Omaha night law school and ultimately received his certificate from the Supreme Court of Nebraska as a lawyer. The depression came on, and he being one of the newer employees, he resigned and started in the practicing of law. After being associated with another young lawyer in the practice of law, Frost, Hammes & Nimitz, attorneys, coming in contact with him and observing his fairness, his very thorough manner in which he handled legal questions, and needing a young lawyer in their office, extended to him an invitation to become associated with them, which he accepted, and where he remained for a period of approximately six years. While there, he was given an opportunity to present matters in the State and Federal Court and won the respect and admiration of all of the judges, who recommend him most highly. Six years ago he was elected a member of the State Railway Commission. We have so many departments of government, all of which are important, but so few people that are called upon to do the voting realize the importance of the qualifications of the men who occupy these positions. Our Supreme Court has said that the office of Railway Commissioner is one of the most important in our State for it has the control of rates and schedules and services of railroads, power companies, taxi cabs, bus lines, streetcars, elevators, truck lines and some other matters. They make the decisions as to what rates taxi cabs can charge. They decide what railroads can discontinue certain trains or a depot or an entire branch line, perhaps. The same applies to the streetcars and truck lines. One to occupy such a position must naturally be well grounded in traffic and he should have a legal education because of so many legal technicalities involved, but best of all, he should be inherently honest, sound and courageous. He has demonstrated all of these qualities in his past six years as a member of the commission. He is the present chairman of the commission. Any and all concerns and individuals that have had matters up before the commission, whether he decides for or against him, praise him because of his thoroughness and fairness. It is therefore imperative to the interest of all voters that such a man be returned and retained in office while rendering such service. I therefore most heartily recommend to all of the voters, Duane T. Swanson for re-election for railway commissioner.

RED CROSS WORKER CITES 'OUTSTANDING BRAVERY OF AMERICAN NEGRO TROOPS'

The "outstanding bravery" of American Negro troops overseas is cited by Miss Virginia Young Romeyn of Philadelphia, recently returned from the battlefields of North Africa, Sicily and Italy.

Miss Romeyn was one of the 'Driving Queens' of an American Red Cross Clubmobile trio. The others were Geraldine Arnold of Delaware, Youngstown, and Columbus, Ohio and Doris Riker of Yonkers, N. Y.

This Clubmobile trio was attached to a corps that included a frontline unit of hand-picked Negro anti-aircraft specialists.

"We saw at first hand what keen soldiers they are," said Miss Romeyn. "We've watched them in action many times."

"We used to bivouac twenty-five miles behind the lines with our doughnut machine and coffee. It took 3 hours every morning to get to the front line through the mud... and 3 hours to get back to our home tent that night."

"As hells occurred in the shellfire, we drove the truck from one gun position to another. The soldiers would take turns leaving their guns to reach the truck. They always had a big smile and seemed grateful that we'd come. We tried to stay long enough each place to talk with them a little. That seemed to help as much as the food."

"I never heard any of them complain. When the shellfire was heavy, they simply would grin and say, 'We're sure having a lot of war today!'"
The three girls set something of a record for their ability to take care of themselves... and their trucks... under difficult conditions. They had an early initiation into such rigors. They drove their mobile unit by them selves from the port of debarkation overseas early last summer, across all North Africa. When the Sicilian campaign got under way, they drove across Sicily in their work. When they landed in Italy, they drove through the slogging mud to bomb-torn Naples. By then, their vehicle was a two-ton weapon carrier with four wheel drive. They managed to reach inaccessible units and somehow, they negotiated the rough terrain and bombed out roads.

In both Sicily and Italy, the girls lived out of their bedding rolls in tents. They shared the same primitive living conditions as the G.I.s... and all the inconveniences. In Italy, however, the soldiers built a wooden floor high above the mud for the girls' tent. They concocted a charcoal stove somehow, and even managed to stretch electric light wiring from a headquarters tent, into the girls' quarters.

"We could hear the big guns all night long," Miss Romeyn recalled. "We never considered our living conditions as inconveniences, and we certainly never minded. Seeing how wonderful the fighting men are about everything... and how much they appreciate each life thing we do, makes Red Cross girls forget everything... except the help that they can give them."

Miss Romeyn is visiting her mother, Mrs. Rosalie Romeyn of Abington, Pa., awaiting a new assignment.

NEW JERSEY TOWN DISCONTINUES EXCLUSION

Livingston, N. J.—For years this Township through its Township Committee and Planning Board, required builders to sign an agreement to exclude Negroes from new developments. Recently this matter came to the attention of the NAACP and the Association's legal department directed a letter of protest to the Livingston authorities, pointing out that since the decision of the U. S. supreme court in Buchanan v. Warley in 1926, such action by an official body is unconstitutional.

The Planning Board of Livingston has written to the Association admitting its violations of the law in the past but stating that in the future, agreements between the

authorities and a builder "will not contain the clause objected to by your organization."

Part of the fund will be used to carry on the Non Partisan Council on Public Affairs, the first full-time lobby for Negroes in America, which was set up and has been maintained by the sorority for some time. The Council supports an office with a full time staff in Washington, DC, where close check is kept on governmental affairs... especially legislation affecting the Negro's welfare, and prompt action to rally support for or against any contemplated action, according to the need, is stimulated.

The Health Project has been carried on in the State of Mississippi for several years, providing medical attention and nursing care for the thousands of Negro families for whom no similar provisions is made from any other source.

This project has been praised by some of the leading figures in the field of public health and is credited with having done much to check the high death rate and incidence of disease which formerly existed among Negroes in the state.

H. L. MOON APPOINTED TO PUBLIC

CIO Political Committee

Appointment of Henry Lee Moon to the public relations staff of the CIO Political Action Committee was announced here today by Sidney Hillman, chairman.

Moon, for the past six years employed by the United States Housing Authority and its successor agency, the Federal Public Housing Authority, as regional racial relations adviser, resigned that post to accept the new position.

Sponsored by the Congress of Racial Equality, Hillman asserted "Labor and other elements of the population who have benefitted by progressive legislative and executive acts during that period have the obligation to see that these gains are not lost due to failure to register and vote for those candidates whose election will assure continued progress. Mr. Moon has been added to our staff to assist in our efforts to obtain these objectives. He will work closely with the press, the trade unions, and with other organizations and groups."

A former newspaper man, Moon was a charter member of the American Newspaper Guild. He has worked with the Cleveland Herald, the Cleveland Call and the New York Amsterdam News. He was a space writer on the New York Times and has contributed to the Nation, the New Republic, Opportunity, the Crisis and other publications.
