Temporarily Tart

Grapefruit Meringue Pie
Pep up lagging appetites with this tangy, fruity, vitamin-rich pie. The filling, a satiny-smooth combination of canned grapefruit juice and fresh orange... poured into a tender, flaky pie shell... topped with a luscious meringue. Your family will say it's the best pie you ever made!



This attractive, fine-eating pie is rich in Vitamin C. With canned grapefruit juice and oranges plentiful, you can serve it often.

Grapefruit Meringue Pie
3 tablespoons cornstarch
2 egg yolks, slightly beaten
2 tablespoons flour
Grated rind and juice of 1 orange
1 cup sugar
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup canned unsweetened grapefruit juice
1 baked flaky Pie Shell

Combine cornstarch, flour, sugar, and salt and mix. Add 1/2 cup grapefruit juice and mix. Add remaining grapefruit juice and cook until mixture begins to thicken; place over boiling water and cook until thick and smooth (15 minutes), stirring occasionally. Stir in small amount of mixture into egg yolks, return to double boiler, and cook a few minutes longer. Add orange rind and juice and cool. Pour into pie shell. Top with meringue made by beating 4 tablespoons sugar gradually into 2 stiffly beaten egg whites. Bake in slow oven (325° F.) 25 minutes.

Spry Pie Shell
Mix 1 1/2 cups sifted ALL-PURPOSE FLOUR and 1/2 teaspoon SALT. Measure out 7 tablespoons SPRY and divide into two equal parts.

STEP 1 for Tenderness—cut in first half of Spry until as fine as meal.

STEP 2 for "flakiness"—cut in remaining Spry until particles are size of large peas.

Add 3 tablespoons cold WATER, mixing thoroughly into a dough. Roll 1/4 inch thick and prick with fork. Fit dough in pan and make fluted rim. Bake in very hot oven (450° F.) 10 to 15 minutes.
