The other evening at an informal buffet supper I saw "in action" the very special convenience of a nest of tables. In this home there were a pair of these very decorative pieces on either side of the fireplace.

As time for refreshments arrived, I noticed there were still no signs of a table being set, although there were eight to be served, and there was plenty of evidence of activity in the kitchen.

The husband appeared with a big tray. This he set on the low cocktail table. And in a twinkling he moved out the two smaller tables from each of the "nests," placing these conveniently by the chairs the guests were occupying. Then the hostess came from the kitchen with a steaming percolator of coffee and a huge platter of sandwiches. When these were passed, each guest shared with another the use of one of the small tables from the nest. It all took place quickly, easily, and gracefully. I realized more strongly than ever why in the recent survey of Imperial Furniture Company—Grand Rapids, nests-of-tables were third in popularity among all types of tables. Since that evening I have been talking with some of my friends who have nests-of-tables in their homes, to learn other uses to which they are being put.

One woman, who has two high school age children, finds that the use of nests solves the problem of a small desk for doing home work. And she herself uses one for writing letters. You can put a small table on diagonal corners for ash trays, drinks, and even score pads, keeping the card table clear for playing.

Your BABY

All babies are not alike; they are individuals. They do not all reach the stage in their development when they want to feed themselves at anywhere near the same age. If your child shows signs of wanting to hold his own cup or spoon, let him think he is holding it himself. As soon as possible, let him do it all without your help.

Even after he starts feeding himself, there will be a good many times—perhaps for weeks—when he will need help toward the end of the meal. Or he may get tired of doing it himself or just be bored and want you to feed him for several meals.

It may save your time and avoid a mess to do the feeding yourself. But the mess has to come some time because he has to learn to feed himself. Your child will enjoy learning to eat by his own efforts, if you let him do it when he is interested. Should you let that time pass, then you will find yourself trying to get him to do something in which he is not at that time interested.

As your child grows, you will have the joy of watching the changes which are constantly taking place. It is not necessary to forego discipline but it is much easier to maintain discipline if you use your child's developing personality to guide him and thus keep him interested in doing what you want him to do.

When he starts to feed himself, make things as easy for him as you can. A curved-handled baby spoon may be easier for him to handle than the regulation teaspoon. Usually a small cup and preferably one with a lip will fit baby's mouth better.

The first foods he feeds himself should be the thick ones, not the more liquid. If his strained vegetable will fall off the spoon easily, thicken it with some of his cereal. Strained fruit that is too thin can be thickened with some of his cereal as this will help it hold to the spoon.

Judy Ann's Cake

Dry Ingredients	Liquid Ingredients
1 1/2 cups sifted cake flour*	1/2 cup milk
1/2 cup sugar	1/2 cup vanilla
1/2 teaspoon baking powder (with a tartaric powder, use 2 teaspoons)	1 egg
1/2 teaspoon salt	
1/2 cup Spry	

Step 1. Put Dry Ingredients Together—No Creaming Needed. . . . Sift flour, sugar, baking powder and salt into mixing bowl. . . Drop in Spry.

Step 2. Add Liquids in Stages—Beat and Blend. . . . Add milk and vanilla and beat until perfectly smooth—about 100 strokes. . . Scrape bowl and spoon often throughout the mixing. . . Add egg and beat thoroughly. . . Note the smoother, easier-pouring batter.

Bake in square 8 x 8 x 2-inch Spry-coated pan in moderate oven (350° F.) 20 to 35 minutes. . . Spread Peanut Butter Frosting on top and sides of cake.

*All-purpose flour can be used, but cake flour gives much better results. If all-purpose flour is used, however, add all the liquid ingredients at the same time and beat well—about 100 strokes.

Peanut Butter Frosting

1 tablespoon Spry	1/2 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons peanut butter	1 1/2 cups sifted confectioners' sugar
1/2 teaspoon vanilla	8 tablespoons scalded top milk (about)

Blend Spry, peanut butter, vanilla and salt. Add confectioners' sugar, alternately with scalded top milk, beating well after each addition. Add only enough milk to make a nice spreading consistency.

Makes enough frosting to cover top and sides of 8 x 8 x 2-inch square cake.
