Congressional Delay Might Lead Other Nations to Think So ... Says Christian Council New York City: Pledging full

support of the Bretton Woods Monetary Agreement, the United Christlan Council for Democracy today warned churchmen over the nation that indefinite delay in Congressional approval might lead other nations to conclude that the United States does not really mean to cooperate in a full program of collective Calling the dual international plan

"an absolutely necessary foundation stone in the structure of world cooperation we must build," the Council declared that the Administration and the leaders in Congress have placed the issue in the hands of the people of the country to decide. 'Members of Congress haven't heard enough from home," the Council says, so that April 25 and San cisco draw near with this nat ion's attitude on Bretton Woods still in doubt, "It is urgent that the millions of American citizens, realizing that an extensive and reliable world trade is essential to full employment and economic security at home and abroad, should quickly express their support of the Fund and Bank to their representatives in the The Council has sent to 10,000

church leaders over the nation a statement of the pros and cons of the world monetary proposal from the religious viewpoint drawing conclusion in favor of both the Fund and the Bank. The statement notes the criticism of the Fund now current among certain of the bankers who argue that it is a new and untried proposal and very risky business for the U.S. The Council contends that the real reason for the opposition to the Fund on the part of some big bankers "more nearly revolve around the apparent fact that under the operations of the Fund they are likely to have less voice, indeed, less control than formerly when, in combination with financial and governmental interests of other nations it has been possible to direct adjustments in currency exchanges to their own advantage. The object of the International Monetary Fund, say the United Christian Council for Democracy churchmen is to eliminate the economic warfare of the past which has been waged with the weapons of international exchange. It is maintained that "unscrupulous manipul ation" of currency in the past has put unearned profits in the hands of tending in the long run, "to restrict the flow of trade and thus to depress the living standards of the majority of the people in any nation which for one uation of its currency", "Could anything be more unsound than a return to the practice of the Thirties? By these munipulatave strategems for profit war became inevitable yesterday and, if continued, will be in-


