Dr. Walter A. Maier, professor JOHNS PLAN PEW RALLY at Concordia Seminary, Saint Louis, broadcasting here in connection with a mass meeting, declared that modern astron omers frequently witness a "fiery finale" of stars much larger than our globe. He challenged skeptics to explain, in the face of this astronomical parallel, why they contradict the New Testament record that "the elements shall melt with fervent heat."

The discovery of atomic energy, Dr. Maier maintained, corroborates the Scriptural statements on the world's end. "If the first atomic bombs men make blast large parts of cities out of existence," he asked "cannot the great God who formed the atom and gave it suchstartling power, use it to destroy His own creation?"

Denouncing date setters who "by their ruthless disregard of Biblical teaching have brought reproach on the Church," the radio speker maintained that the signs set in Scripture as signals for the approaching end are being fulfilled in our age as never before. Wars and rumors of wars, earthquakes, famines, pestilences, wide-spread fear and falling from faith all recorded as signs of the last times are the tell-tale marks of our age, he asserted.

Dr. Maier asked for a militant, faithful, Bible-built church that can "help stem the rising tide of atheism and unbelief in a world where masses have lost God."

2. Senseless Tumun (vv. 25-30) Knowing that their opposition was without true foundation, they inspired and agitated a wild demon-

stration Shouting a slogan which had no real meaning, they lent their voices to the tumultuous agitation against God. Finally, one sensible man fearing the punishment of city of ficials, quieted them (Acts 19:35-41) The Ephesians were just like

We fight great spiritual enemies (see vv. 11, 12 of this chapter) and we need the best in both offensive and defensive equip ment.

The girdle of truth binds up the warrior and eliminates the hindrances to rapid movement. The breastplate is righteousness, not his own but Christ's, but it must be

appropriated and used. The soldier must be well shod for the long rough journeys and to give him a good foothold in the day of battle. Peace in the heart provide such a firm vantage point in the figh-

Faith is the quickly moved shield. catching all the fiery darts. Here again it is not my faith or yours alone, but our faith in God, putting him between us and our ene
