Saint Louis, December 15, (Special) The eyes of the world should be directed not to Washington, London, Moscow for the hope of real peace but to Bethlehem, Dr. Walter A. Maier professor of Concordia Seminary, declared here today in an International Lutheran Hour broadcast.

Maintaining that a peace and new world order established contrary to the principles of Christ will provide only for another period of armament and armistice, he asked Christians of America and Canada to join in fervent prayer that the denials of the Almighty may not secure control of our international relations.

As a counter-measure to the advance of atheism throughout the postwar world, Dr. Maier proposed this slogan, "All the Gospel for all men in all nations," as the statement of program for all churches. As past periods of war gave rise to important missionary movements, so, he maintained, Christians throughout the world should systematically work to regain the serious losses inflicted by the war and to widen the horizons of historical Christian faith.
