NEW YORK—In Long Branch, New Jersey, where the NAACP is attempting to eliminate segregation in the public schools, a note signed by the Ku Klux Klan has been widely circulated. The note, demanding Long Branch citizens to "Help keep America free from niggers," has recently been turned over to the FBI.

Due to NAACP efforts, the Long Branch school board has promised to create a five-year plan to integrate Negro and white pupils and teachers in the city's schools. As its first step, the school board has requested two white teachers for an elementary school which has a predominantly colored attendance.

GERSHWIN MEMORIAL TO BE EXPANDED

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — The George Gershwin Memorial Collection Endowment fund at Fisk University has been started with a gift of \$1,000 according to an announcement by Doctor Charles S. Johnson, President. This contribution, which wins an equal sum for the University's general endowment from the Gershwin Education Board was made by Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Rieser, Ravinia, Illinois; Mr. and Mrs. Morton L. Wallerstein, Richmond, Virginia; and Mr. and Mrs. M. L. Blumenthal, Elkins Park, Virginia.

The income from the George Gershwin Memorial Collection Endowment Fund will be used to maintain and expand the George Gershwin Memorial Collection of Music and Musical Literature founded at Fisk by Mr. Carl Van Vechten of New York. The Collection, which already contains more than 5,000 items including many original manuscripts, was formally opened April 25,—at which time Mr. Van Vechten made an appeal for an endowment fund to guarantee the Collection's growth and usefulness for future generations. Mr. and Mrs. Rieser were present for the opening ceremony and subsequently told Doctor Johnson of their desire to initiate the Memorial Endowment Fund. In her letter transmitting the gift, Mrs. Rieser said: "Here is the \$1,000 with which to start the George Gershwin Memorial Collection Endowment Fund at Fisk. It comes from the children of my mother, Clara U. Wallerstein, and their spouses—As I think I told you, we started such a music library in Richmond which has been a great success. I can't think of a surer cause. I wish you luck on this project and trust that other lovers of music will become interested." Carl Van Vechten has expressed his great appreciation of the generous gift and says: "It is my hope that other will feel inspired to contribute to the George Gershwin Memorial Collection Endowment Fund."

JOB CEILING LIFTED IN PENTAGON CAFETERIAS

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Action by the NAACP's Labor Department cracked the illy-white hiring policy of the National Foods Corporation this week when Mrs. Willis Bernard, graduate of Virginia State College and former Army hostess, went to work as a cafeteria supervisor in the Pentagon.

Although the Corporation, which has its headquarters in Chicago and which manages the Pentagon's cafeterias, has hired many colored persons as counter-girls and bus boys, it refused to employ Mrs. Bernard when she answered an advertisement in the Washington Post asking for applicants for the job of cafeteria supervisor. Mrs. Bernard, who holds a B. S. degree, was told by the personnel director, Mr. Lewis Rhodes, that she met all requirements but when he learned that she was colored refused to employ her. The NAACP was informed by Mr. Rhodes that it was against his company's policy to hire colored supervisors, and an advertisement appeared again in the Post asking for a white supervisor.

After intervention by Clarence Mitchell, NAACP Labor Secretary, Mr. A. C. Boehm, Manager of the Pentagon cafeterias, agreed to hire Mrs. Bernard. However, when Mr. Boehm left for his vacation, subordinates again refused to employ the colored woman. The NAACP dispatched a protest wire to Mr. Boehm and the following day Mrs. Bernard was instructed to report for duty.
