O. Does the government pay the first year's interest on a G. I. loan which is guaranteed?

A. No. When the loan is reported to the Veterans Administration for guaranty, VA makes a "gift" to the veteran of 4 percent of the guaranteed portion of the loan. This sum is then applied against the principal of the lioan: or, if the borrower wishes, he may use it to pay part of the first year's interest on the loan. 
