Loans for the construction of three more large scale apartments to be constructed in the State have just been approved by Federal Housing Administration, Holger Holm, State Director of FHA announced today.

The are as follows: Novek Apartments, northeast corner of Thirty-first St. and Poppleton Avenue, Omaha, to be built by Poppleton Apartments, Inc., headed by Merritt W. Kevan, for 12 living units, financed by The Prudential Insurance Company, Omaha, for \$80,500.

Linden Terrace Apartments at Eleventh St. from L. St. to Somers Avenue, Fremont, Nebraska, to be built by Fremont Properties, Inc., headed by Arthur Baldwin, Fremont, for 6 living units, financed by The City National Bank, Council Bluffs, Iowa, for \$349,100.

Northeast Terrace at Twenty-ninth and Cotner Boulevard, Lincoln, Nebraska, to be built by The Greater Lincoln Housing Corporation, for 24 units, financed by Security Mutual Life Insurance Company, Lincoln, Nebraska, for \$135,500.

"This makes a total of 19 large-scale rental-housing structures of a total of 290 living units on which construction loans have been approved by FHA for a total of \$1,917,500." Mr. Holm said. "Twelve of these apartment houses are to be built in Lincoln. The other seven will be in Omaha, Fremont, Grand Island and South Sioux City."

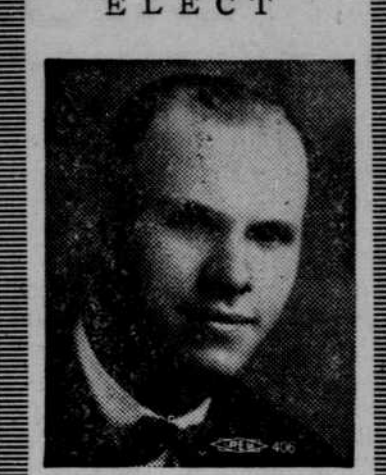
