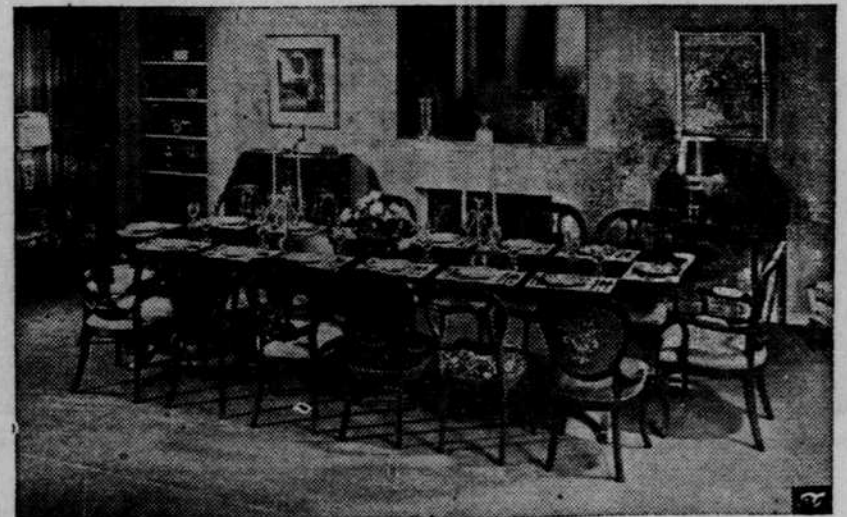
These fellows are both Henry all right (last names) and they have a
