Enemies Tactics Are Desperate Of the Association's members Mr. Spingarn declared: "It is in large part due to their devotion to the democratic way of life and to their belief in the ideals set forth in our American Constitution that the NAACP has become at this time a significant and, in fact, a powerful instrument in achieving equal citizenship rights for all Americans. Our enemies know this, and their tactics in fighting us have become the tactics of desperation.

"Some of our members have been victims of the economic pressures exerted by the White Citizens Councils. Others have been threatened with violence for advocating civil rights and desegregation. I am certain that the great majority of American citizens who believe in equality of opportunity admire the courage of our people in these troubled times, and I personally salute their refusal to bow down to the forces of bigotry."
