St. Louis To Reduce Job Bias

ST. LOUIS, MO. — The St. Louis NAACP branch soon will begin a special program to reduce racial discrimination in employment in this area, it was announced here this week by Ernest Calloway, branch president. Mr. Calloway said the program will be "one of the major continuing activities of the St. Louis NAACP for the next several years."

An Employment Opportunities Council has been formed within the NAACP branch to conduct the work. Council chairman is T. D. McNeal, national vice president of the Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters.

Working with the Council will be professional consultants from social agencies, St. Louis University and Washington University, Mr. Calloway said. He described the Council's projected program as incorporating the following work:

1. Seek greater employment of the Negro in the sales, administrative and clerical levels in banks, department stores, super-markets, automobile sales agencies and other consumption goods outlets.
2. Seek the removal of the discriminatory bars against Negroes practiced by labor unions in St. Louis and its environs.

Heart Asso. Says Fat No Heart Risk

Drastic changes in the amount or type of fats consumed by the general public cannot be justified by existing evidence as a means of reducing the risk of heart attacks or strokes.

The Nebraska Heart Association reports this is the conclusion of the Nutrition Committee of the American Heart Association, published in the August 31st issue of Journal of American Medical Association.

The Committee says, "This is a time when great pressure is being put on physicians to do something about the reported increased death rate from heart attacks in relatively young people. People want to know whether they are eating themselves into premature heart disease."

"In the opinion of the authors of this review, there is not enough evidence available to permit a rigid stand on what the relationship is between nutrition, particularly the fat content of the diet, and atherosclerosis and coronary heart disease.

"We are certain of one thing—the evidence now in existence justifies the most thorough investigation. This should be done soon, thoroughly, and uncompromisingly."

The average American diet now provides 40% of calories from fat. This should be reduced to 25% as a sensible means of overcoming obesity of maintaining normal weight, recommend the authors.

"Such a diet should provide more protein from lean meat, fish, poultry, and grain products, cereal and grain products, and a reasonable selection of fruits and vegetables. The fat content should be sufficient only to meet caloric and essential fatty acid demands."

They believe the reported alarming increase in coronary heart disease in the past couple of generations may have resulted from changes in reporting deaths, better diagnosis, and acceptance of broader concepts of coronary disease by doctors filling out death certificates.

Many high blood pressure patients, who 20 years ago would have been condemned to bed, today can lead normal productive lives because of improved treatment, reports Nebraska Heart Association.

6 tablespoons water
½ cup sugar
Dash of salt
¾ tablespoons butter
¼ teaspoon vanilla

METHOD: Combine chocolate and water in saucepan and place over low heat, stirring until blended. Add sugar and salt. Cook until sugar is dissolved and mixture very slightly thickened, stirring constantly. Add butter and vanilla, blend. Makes about 1 cup sauce.

Terrorism Reported In Little Rock

NEW YORK — The Arkansas State NAACP is "holding the line" against opponents of school desegregation, Mrs. L. C. Bates of Little Rock, NAACP state president, reported today to G. I. Current, the Association's director of branches.

School desegregation in Little Rock is scheduled to start with the high schools on September 3 and gradually work down to the lower grades. The Little Rock school board is going ahead with desegregation despite legal action taken by several parents to stop the move.

The Arkansas NAACP leader told Mr. Current that "there is a real campaign of terror going on down here. A cross was burned in front of my house on Sunday night. They broke my picture window on Tuesday night. We have set up flood lights in front of my home and it is being guarded around the clock."

Mr. Current noted that Mrs. Bates has been the target of abuse from the White Citizens Councils and other hate groups for the past year, suffering cross burnings, vile telephone calls and other forms of intimidation, as a result of her work for desegregation in Arkansas.
