#### **NAACP Calls Little Rock** Threat To U.S.

New York, Sept. 6-The defiance of Federal authority at Little Rock, Arkansas, by Gov. Orval Faubus "threatens the entire concept of a Federal union and endangers a wide category of rights and privileges of citizens of the United States wherever they may live," President Eisenhower was told in a telegram yesterday.

The wire, sent by Roy Wilkins, NAACP executive secreetary, said the use of state troops by Gov. Faubus to prevent Negro students from attending Central high school pursuant to a Federal court order stemmed from an idea that "states and regions are free to decide whether to abide by the Constitution and the Federal K. 
