forts on that projected railroad to the south of Alliance; for—and mark well the prediction of the Tribune—the county seat of Box Butte county will remain at Hemingford, no matter what course they pursue. Hemingford is geographically centrally located, her business houses have substantial financial backing, and the surrounding territory is settled up with thrifty and prosperous class of pioneer farmers and cattle men, who made their present investments in confidence that the present county seat would be retained as such for many years to come; and the rank injustice that would be done these manifold interests by its removal will never be sanctioned by the level-headed, fair-minded working leaders of the business men of Alliance, even if the balance of power to decide such a contest should be in their hands. To do otherwise would bear too close a resemblance to the autocratic power assumed by England in her dealings with "poor old Ireland," Russia toward Poland or Turkey toward Armenia, as it would crush the life out of a deserving competitor and would result in but meagre benefit to Alliance, while the citizens of Hemingford and the tributary country north and west would be greatly wronged and suffer much in consequence of change of the county seat.

Alliance has the B. & M. round house and machine shops, the '400' and U. S. Land office, none of which Hemingford has ever tried to molest, but now show their boggishness by wanting the county seat. We object.

Senator Hill has started much gossip by renting a large house in Washington and reports as to his intentions cover every imaginable thing from getting married to opening a political club house for the starting of a new boom for the presidential nomination. It is probable that his personal convenience was his only reason for setting up housekeeping.

This week the county clerk received from the treasurer of Hall county a draft for \$99.90 payable to the treasurer of this county in payment for costs advanced by this county in the case of A. J. McKnight, insane, who was tried before the commissioners of insanity of this county last summer and sent to the hospital at Lincoln, his legal residence being in Hall county.

As the annual report of the heads of the various branches of the government service are made it is easy to see that democratic ideas of economy in public expenditures have been put into effect wherever possible. The grand aggregate of all the saving effected may be found in the footings of the ordinary expenditure column of the U. S. Treasurer's annual report. Those footings show that for the fiscal year ending June 30, last, the government spent for ordinary purposes \$11,329,981 less than was spent during the previous year.

With few exceptions democrats are agreed that it is the duty of the democratic senators to retain the control of the Senate until they are forced to give it up. There will be no occasion to fill the vacancy in the office of President pro tem of the Senate so long as Vice-President Stoverson is on hand every day to preside over the Senate, and he can be counted upon to be on hand unless prevented by serious illness. It is understood that the democratic steering committee of the Senate will recommend following this line of policy; also that every measure which comes before the Senate shall be fully debated by the democrats, in order that the position of the party may be thoroughly understood by the country. The republican senators can, of course, obtain control of the Senate at once with the assistance of the populist and without their aid if Dupont is seated from Delaware when the Utha senators take their seats, which will probably be early in the coming year, if they can agree among themselves, but up to this time they are a long ways from agreeing, and by harmonious and skillful tactics the democrats may remain in control during the entire session.
