PARTY LINES CUT NO FIGURE.

Republicans of Norfolk Come Out for the White Metal and Organize a Bryan club in which Rev. Dr. Jennings, formerly of this County, Takes an Active Part.—Free Silver clubs are being organized all over the State.

Norfolk, Neb., July 28.—A Bryan club, 200 strong, was organized here last night on very short notice. Judge H. D. Kelly was made temporary chairman and C. W. Crum, secretary. Both of these gentlemen are old-line republicans and enthusiastic silver men. The following officers were elected: Hon. G. A. Laikhart, president; Dr. A. D. Tashjian, I. M. Hull, H. D. Kelly, W. T. Shively and C. D. Jenkins vice presidents; C. W. Crum, secretary, and J. C. Still, treasurer.

Rousing speeches were made by Rev. J. W. Jennings of Fullerton, William F. Porter of Merrick county and W. E. Reed of Madison.

Both Rev. Jennings and W. E. Reed prefaced their remarks with the statement that they had voted for Blaine and also for Harrison, but that when the republican party had turned down bimetalism at St. Louis they could not, as honest men, follow.

The club membership includes quite a number of former republicans, among whom are W. O. Tolliver and Seth Kethledge, dry goods merchants; H. D. Kelly, attorney, and C. W. Crum, real estate agent. The club membership is rapidly increasing, as the free silver sentiment continues to grow.

E. C. House, the genial representative of the old reliable New York Life Insurance company, has been in town this week and written several policies. Mr. House is a life long republican but is talking "tooth and toe nail" for Wm. J. Bryan. Nine out of ten of the travelling men are doing so.

Hon. A. L. Sharrock, Mayor of Edgemont, who is an old-line republican, has declared himself for the white metal and Bryan.

According to the Edgemont Advocate, the meaning of 16 to 1 in that city is that there are 16 silver men to one gold bug.

The ladies of the M. E. church will give a campaign sociable at the court house Friday evening, Aug. 7th. Mrs. A. M. Miller was chosen chairman of the prohibition camp, Mrs. Sweeney of the republican, Mrs. Switzer of the democratic and Mrs. Nichols of the populist. If we hold an error to loose it is our gain.
