Co. Board Proceedings.
County Clerk's office, July 30, 1896.

Board of county commissioners met as per adjournment. Present, James Hollinrake chairman, James Barry and G. W. Duncan.

Petition was presented by Enos Kerr and 35 others asking that a public road be opened between townships 25 and 26 and described as follows, commencing on the Sheridan county line at the junction of the northeast corner of section 1, township 25, range 47 with the Sheridan county line, thence running west between township 25 and 26 a distance of six miles to the range line between 47 and 48. Also remonstrance against the opening of said line was signed by William Kline and 19 others.

After due consideration the board finds that the public good requires the opening of such line and as authorized by section 46, compiled statute of Nebraska, for year 1895, they declare this line to be opened for public travel. The clerk is instructed to notify the overseer to remove obstruction and cause it to be worked same as other public roads.

Petition was presented by G. W. Erb and 29 others asking that a public road be opened commencing at the southwest quarter of section 6-25-47 and running due east six miles to southeast corner section 1-25-47; also remonstrance against the same signed by C. C. Stevens and 34 others. Since neither petition nor remonstrance shows the location of the signers, it is deemed advisable and is ordered by the board that the matter be laid over until the next regular meeting in order to give both parties time to make a complete showing. On motion board adjourned for dinner.

Afternoon session. Full board present.

Petition was presented signed by Nelson Bears and 21 others asking that a public road be opened commencing at southeast corner section 1-26-49 and running due west to southwest corner sec 6-26-52. The petition not showing location of signers and objection being made in person to the opening of said line, the board decided to lay the matter over until the next regular meeting to give each side opportunity to make complete showing.

Samuel Naugle presented tax receipt No. 3333 showing tax for 1895 on southwest quarter 35-27-52 paid under protest, and asked that the amount be refunded on the ground that the land at that time was not subject to taxation. The board after investigation ordered the treasurer to refund said taxes.

On motion board adjourned till 9 a. m., July 31, 1896.

Board met as per adjournment. All members present.

John O'Keefe appeared before the board and asked that one John Prokop, now a county

charge at the poor farm, be turned over to his care and Mr. O'Keefe offered to care for and clothe said Prokop return for such services as the boy may be able to render. The board believing that the boy would be well cared for while in Mr. O'Keefe's charge, issued an order to P. H. Zobel lessee of the poor farm, directing him to turn him over to Mr. O'Keefe.

A. E. Tunberg having moved from this county leaving personal tax of 1895 amounting to \$40.46 and interest, unsettled, and the treasurer having issued distress warrant which was returned by the sheriff with \$39.10 realized after paying legal expenses, it appearing to the board that the balance of said tax is uncollectible and that the treasurer has used due diligence in endeavoring to collect, they hereby authorize him to apply said \$39.10 upon the tax and strike balance from tax list.

On motion board adjourned for dinner.

Afternoon session. All members present.

Resignations were presented and accepted as follows: Pete Kearney, overseer R. D. 29. G. W. Parrott, " " 14. Jno. E. Hunt, " " 27. Lewis Mackey, " " 28.

Resignation of L. H. Mosher, J. P., Lake precinct, was received and laid over till next meeting.

Bids to furnish the county with coal were opened and contract let to lowest bidder as follows: to Hemingford Milling Company to furnish one car hard coal (egg size) f. o. b. cars at Hemingford at \$12 per ton.

Attention of board having been called to certain funds shown on treasurer's books as due the state viz:

Page 19, Jan. 3, 1894, \$420, lease " 21, " 3, " 200, prin. " 28, " 3, " 250, Int.

and of which books do not show disposition, the matter was referred to former treasurer Keefe who thereupon presented to board a receipt from the state treasurer showing these funds to have been paid to him, whereupon the board directs that credits be entered on treasurer's books accordingly.

A list of sixty names was then prepared from which to draw jury for Sept. 22nd term of court and filed as required by law.

The board then took up the consideration of claims and after obtaining certificate of delinquent personal taxes due from the several claimants, allowed the following claims and ordered warrants drawn on the general fund, levy of 1896, for such balances as may remain after deducting such taxes.
