Important Events of the Week Gleaned from the Dailies.

Heavy bank failures at Minneapolis, Minn., Sioux City, Iowa, and Superior, Wis.

The Cuban filibuster, Three Friends, failing to land her latest expedition on Cuban soil, leaves it on an island, and returning is captured by U. S. revenue cutters.

A passenger train goes through a bridge 120 feet high across the Cahaba river in Alabama and is burned to the waters edge. 27 lives are lost and 11 persons are missing.

Gen. L. W. Colby, of Beatrice, is preparing to organize an army to assist the Cubans in gaining their independence as soon as this government gives them official recognition.

A large hill 100 feet high, in the county Kerry, Ireland, becoming loosened by continuous rains, slides into the Flesk river, damming it up and causing great loss of life and property.

Sioux City, Ia., Dec. 28 — Don-McLean, the original organizer of the Pacific Short line, arrived here today to arrange for a survey of the road from O'Neil, Neb., to San Francisco. The road was started six years ago, but only got from Sioux City to O'Neil before the crash of local business enterprise in 1893 forced its abandonment. As planned it will be 264 miles shorter than any other transcontinental line. Mr. McLean claims to be backed by \$32,000,000 of English capital and says the work will be rushed through.—State Journal Dec. 29.
