## SPANISH GENERAL'S LETTER

NO FOOD, NO AMUNITION A HELPLESS ARMY.

All That is Necessary is to Allow American Ships to Take the Dons in Out of the Wet Sees No Escape.

Camp McCalla, Outer Harbor of a. m.-The following intercepted remander at Guantanamo was taken from the body of an unfortunate messenger who attempted to pass the Cuban lines. It gives the official Spanish version of the attack of the American fleet in the capture of the outer He Guantanamo harbor, and discloses the fact that starvation is facing the Spanish troops in Eastern Cuba.

This is verified by extracts from a Santiago paper, recently cabled, and the fact that some Spanish troops have surrendered at the American camp, with the excuse for so doing that they

were starving. The letter reads; Calmanera, June 13.—To the Comsion of Santiago de Cuba: At dawn on Saturday seven ships appeared before shot and all kinds of projectiles on the Playa del Este and the Cayo Toro, until they set fire to the fort on the Playa del Este, burning the houses of the pilots, which were occupied by a detachment of American marines.

POWERLESS TO HURT SHIPS. The cannonading continued with more or less intensity until 5 o'clock in the afternoon. A Long Drawn Out War the Probable Outcome.

Washington, D. C., June 21 .- The sec ond American council of war was held at the White house and it was decided to push the Porto Rico expedi-tion to the utmost, to seize all the chief points in the eastern end of Cuba, to prepare for Camara's squadron, wherever it may be bound, to pour into Cuba an army of 200,000 troops and to issue a third call fer volunteers and to be in readiness to reinforce Shafter.

## Summer Supply of Hogs.

So far as the estimates of observers can suggest the indications in regard to the marketable supply of hogs in the west for the summer season, March to October inclusive, point to no important change in comparison with last year, the average of returns showing

about 4 per cent increase.

While the investigation of the Price 'urrent a year ago suggested a moderate gain in the marketable supply of hogs for the summer season the estimated gain was far short of the increase shown by the records. So far as the returns indicate the estimated percentage increase varies but little in comparison with such estimates last year-but it should be borne in mind that the comparison this year is with the decidedly enlarged basis, the full significance of which may not have been fully taken in account by some of the correspondents.

In consequence of returns recently obtained from our special correspondents results in the following averages by states: Ohio, 105; Indiana, 104; Illinois, 103; Nebraska, 110; Minnesota, 95; Wisconsin, 100; Michigan, 103; Kentucky 100; Tennessee, 97.
