Latest War News.

New York, July 14.—The federal censor in New York, Mr. Grant Squires, stated at 3:15 p. m. today that official announcement might be made that the surrender of Santiago had been verified, and at exactly 3 o'clock this afternoon the city was formally turned over to us.

The following telegram from Washington was received at noon today.

July 15.—Americans took possession of Santiago at daybreak. Spanish stacked arms and moved to east end of city. All of the forts, five gun boats, two cruisers and 15,000 stand of small arms were surrendered. American gunners are occupying Moro castle and all other Spanish forts.

The board of county commissioners will convene next Monday for the purpose of calling a special election to submit the question of the re-location of the county seat. As there seems to be a few people in Alliance who cannot rest until an election is called, we presume it may just as well be called now as at any other time and the matter will then be settled for five years. When it comes to voting, the farmers and tax-payers will not allow themselves to be bulldozed by the Alliance schemers who are working the deal for their own personal interests. Doubtless the schemers will resort to anything to secure votes but the farmers and tax-payers will meet them at every turn.
