Postage Stamps.

Stamps were put on the market in August, 1847, but were so little used that the government had to pass a law enforcing propayment of postage, which went into effect in 1855 Before this action was taken scarcely one letter in a dozen was found with a stamp affixed. Today the postoffices of the country sell 4,000,000,000 stamps (counting postal cards, stamped envelopes and stamps of all kinds), valued at \$75,000,000, during a single year.

Other patrons have demanded the same privileges and bave abused them, and the result is that to compousate for interest on money owing by solvent debtors and for profit on all his goods, and the prices are accordingly high. On the other hand, American women shopping abroad seem to be bargain mad, and their offorts to beat down prices inspire the tradesman with much the same feeling that a well trained butler experiences when his houveau riche master econcmizes on his wines. In fact, looking for bargains in Bond street is folly .- San Francisco Argonaut.
