

No candidate indirectly or direct-19, under penalty of fine of \$50 or six F. Reyner's addition to Broken wheat are cash at good figures, for any entertainment to any meet-Land and city property have a mar- ing of electers previous to election; give away or treat to any drinks, ation or election of any candidate penses and then not in excess of sums as follows:

For 5,000 votes or less, \$100; for each 100 voters over 5,000 and under 25,000 \$5,50, for each 100 voters over 25,000 and under 50,000 \$1; and nothing additional for voters over 50,000.

Any payment, contribution or expenditure, or agreement or offer to pay, contribute or expend any money or thing of value, in excess of the limit prescribed by this act, for any or all such objects or purposes, is hereby declared to be unlawful and to make void the election of the person making it. But this section shall not apply in cases where such nomination of such candidates, or any rival candidate for the same office, shall have been made prior to the taking effect of law. Nothing in this section shall refer to traveling expenses.

It shall be unlawful for any candidate for any office which is to be filled by popular election under the constitution or laws of the state, or for any member of a political committee to pay, contribute, promise or offer, or to procure or connive at value for the purpose of procuring, expenses in connection with the naturalization of any alien' and any violation of this section shall be punishable by a fine of not less than nor more than thirty days.
