The list of casualties and deaths in the First Nebraska regiment shows the number to be 223. Of this number sixty-one are deaths either in action, from wounds or from disease, and 162 are wounds received in action. Company M of Broken Bow had two deaths, and nine of their number received wounds while in action. The dead in Company M are Cuy H. Livingston, killed in action at Santa Mesa, February 5, and Nat E. Sims died March 26th of wounds received near Manila. The wounded are Hugh Kenoyer, Howard L. Kerr, M. C. Sheppard, George L. Sears, P. L. Busio, Orson Humphrey, Jack L. Berch, Monroe Spence and Horace Kennedy. John L. Perrin and Brent Hatton of Company M remained in Manila, from choice, where they have secured good positions. Stewart Lanterman of Broken Bow was among the number left at Manila, being unable to leave the hospital on account of a severe fever, and Dr. W. E. Talbot, also of Broken Bow, remained at Manila, where he is now president of the board of health of that city.

The experiment of making a railroad dust-proof and water-proof by the use of crude oil has been tried during the past year in the east with success. In the west, the Burlington railroad is the first to adopt the improvement. General Superintendent Colvert has had part of the Wyoming division of the Burlington treated with crude oil, and the results there have been so satisfactory that he is making arrangements to continue the work elsewhere on the system. Two cars were especially arranged for sprinkling the track and the road-bed with the oil. Oil was sprinkled in the center of the track and on the outside of the rails for about five feet. One application of the oil keeps the track free from dust for about one year. The number of hot-boxes on trains is considerably lessened, and the comfort of passengers is greatly enhanced. An additional advantage found in treating the track with oil is that moisture will not then penetrate through the oiled outer crust. Instead, the water runs off the track into the ditches at the side. Vegetation along the track is destroyed by the use of oil.

**Democratic Convention.**

The democratic county convention was held in the opera house yesterday afternoon. An organization was effected by electing Dr. C. L. Mullins chairman, and M. C. Warrington, secretary. The usual committees were appointed.

On motion of Eastham, the temporary organization was made permanent.

W. D. Blackwell, W. B. Eastham and M. C. Warrington were committee on resolutions. The resolutions endorsed the Chicago platform, W. J. Bryan, Attorney General Smyth, and were against trusts. Harrington, of O'Neill, was recommended as candidate for congress. The resolutions were adopted.

On motion the convention proceeded to nominate a county ticket. Diah Woodruff was nominated for treasurer; Thos. Finlen for sheriff; W. B. Eastham for county clerk; Prof. J. M. Scott for county superintendent; M. C. Warrington for county judge; E. J. Boblitz for surveyor; and Dr. C. L. Mullins for coroner by acclamation. The only contest was on clerk of the district court between Chas. Smith and R. P. Brigham. The vote resulted in eighteen for Brigham and eleven for Smith. M. C. Warrington was elected chairman of the county central committee, and Harry Cox secretary. Committeemen were then chosen for the several townships, and delegates elected to the judicial, congressional and state conventions. Speeches were made by Judge Boblitz, Dr. Mullins, Bob Farley and C. H. Holcomb.

The Greater America Exposition at Omaha is unique in one notable respect. It is the first national fair to contain a United States colonial exhibit. Cuba, Puerto Rico, Hawaii, Guam and the Philippines are all represented. Several hundred natives of the islands over which the stars and stripes are now flying, are in attendance at the various villages. There is also an up to date war exhibit to remind visitors of the victories by which the oceanic islands were won. Chicago has contributed its famous Libby Prison Museum of War Relics, and it is suitably installed in the Government building. The renowned Verestchagin collection of paintings and the Chicago Record's collection of original drawings and sketches of the American-Spanish war are features of the Art Institute. The Midway is fantastic, unreal and bizarre, yet, withal, instructive and entertaining. The buildings and grounds of the exposition represent an expenditure of over \$2,000,000. The grounds include over 300 acres and the fence around them is over five miles in length. The architecture of the main buildings has been equalled only by that of the world's Fair. The several tracts are beautifully rich with grasses, flowerbeds and the richest foliage, trees, plants and shrubbery from California, Louisiana, Florida, and Hawaii have been imported by the car-load. Most of these are extremely valuable and rare in this latitude. The floral adornment throughout is distinctively tropical. More than 250,000 new plants have been set out this year by the famous landscape artist, Rudolph Ulrich, palms and oleanders predominating. A crowning feature of the exposition is the electrical illumination. Nearly 50,000 lights are used in the lighting of the Court of Honor flashing and gleaming from balustrade to the loftiest spires and pinnacles, from pillard colonnade to gilded dome. Since the opening of the exposition on July 1, the attendance has largely been from Omaha and nearby points. There is every reason to believe that the months of September and October will see enormous crowds from more distant points. At the Trans-Mississippi exposition last year over 1,500,000 admissions were recorded in the autumn months, after the farmers in the West had harvested their grain, and a repetition of this movement is more than likely to occur this year.

On motion the convention recommended the following names for appointment as judges and clerks of election: North side—clerks, C. R. Luce, Jud Kay; judges, Wm. Barrett, R. E. Glass, J. W. Bruce. South side—clerks, C. P. Russell, L. E. Cole; judges, Jud Morton, P. A. Walton, T. M. Brewer. Ed. Royce was selected township committeeman.
