AN ENTHUSIASTIC MEETING.

Chaplain Malley greeted with a Large
Crowd at the Opera House.

Assaulted by the Enemy, but Came out
Victorious.

The largest and most enthusiastic
political gathering held in this city
this season, greeted Chaplain Malley
at the opera house Monday night.
On his arrival Monday evening he
was met at the train by a number of
his comrades of Company M, who
took in charge and entertained him
during his stay. For nearly two
hours he discussed the political
issues in a forcible and able manner.
As the audience entered the hall,
each person was handed a printed
copy of a letter headed "The Man
Now," dated January 30, 1899, at
Manila, written by Chaplain Malley
to Congressman Stark, in opposi-
tion to holding the Philippines, and
censuring Col. Stotsenburg for his
strict discipline of the soldiers, re-
ferring to his unpopularity at that
time with the regiment. Just how
he would answer this unexpected
attack from the foe caused no little
anxiety by his friends. But it
proved a bomb shell in the camp of
the enemy before he was through
with it, judging from the pale com-
plexion of some of the leaders who
had been prominent in securing the
distribution of the circulars. As
he remarked he had a painful duty
to perform, he displayed the circu-
lar, acknowledged the authorship of
the letter, and confessed it set forth
his honest convictions at the time it
was written, which was prior to the
beginning of the actual warfare in
the Philippines. He first took up
Col. Stotsenburg, and related how
grandly and heroically he led his
regiment in every engagement, and
how his men, with whom he had
been so unpopular but a short time
before, were forced to see his real
worth, as well as the benefits to them
resulting from his strict discipline,
concluding with a grand eulogy on
Col. Stotsenburg, for his courage
and unselfish devotion for his men,
and indignantly denounced those
who for the purpose of party suc-
cess, would drag from an honored
grave the bones of a dead hero, who
fell in defense of his flag, at the
head of his command. His denun-
ciation was severe of the
leaders of the party who would
resort to such tactics. In taking
up the portion of the letter in
which he opposed the annexation of
the Philippines at that time, he said
it was after he saw the Filipinos in
war, that he knew them more per-
fectly, and was forced to change
his opinion of their ability of self
government, and had so expressed
himself in a letter to a New York
magazine, written the first week in
April. As to changing his views
on the money question, and the
other fads of the populist party, he
had little to say, but said that when
he reached the United States and
saw the country prospering as never
before, he realized the utter failure
of Bryan's predictions, and to be
true to his convictions, was again
forced to acknowledge that the
promises of the republican party
had been made good, and as an
honest man he could do nothing
else than espouse the cause of the
present administration. He assured
his audience that both populists and
democrats approved of his course,
as they frequently told him in '98,
when he espoused the cause of Bry-
an and 16-to-1, that he was the kind
of preacher they liked to see, and
wished all preachers would be true
to their convictions, and boldly
advocate what they believe to be
right, and that was what he was
doing then, and is what he is doing
now. During his address he was
enthusiastically applauded, and at
the conclusion he was accorded a
warm reception by a large number
of his audience.
