The "emancipation from Rome" movement spreads apace and gathers power in eastern Europe, assuming proportions which make it an object of serious concern at the vatican. It has extended to 323 localities in Upper and Lower Austria, Bohemia, Styria, Moravia, Corinthia and Salzburg. Its converts are numbered by thousands and so far the church has found no means of checking it, and its symptoms are those of a new reformation.
