**Burlington Notes.**  
 Good luck seems to be scattered all along the Burlington's new line up the North Platte Valley to Guernsey, Wyo. The discovery of an apparently inexhaustible gravel bed on the new line is the latest report. The gravel is of a quality excellent for ballasting purposes, and will save hauling many cars of smelter slag.

The new through trains of the Burlington and Northern Pacific railroads between St. Louis and Portland will make the second longest run in America. The distance is 2,874 miles. On and after April 29, daily trains will run over this long stretch without change of any kind. The longest run of a through train is between New Orleans and San Francisco by the Southern Pacific.

An interesting bit of railroad history was brought out by the recent visit of General C. Robinson Griggs, of New York to Denver. Besides being a great railroad contractor he has served in the legislature of Illinois and Massachusetts. In an interview he said: "I have built 640 miles of railroad in my lifetime. The piece of work in which I have been engaged that is of most interest to Westerners is the old Missouri River and Lincoln line, which was the first road built as far as the capital of Nebraska, and indeed the first road in the state. It was built about 1864 by Governor Denison, Joseph Drexel, myself, and several others. This route is now a part of the Burlington system, which has since expanded to nearly 8,000 miles."
