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CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

Of the Commercial Club of Broken Bow.

CONSTITUTION

ART. 1.—The name of this organization shall be THE COMMERCIAL CLUB OF BROKEN BOW, NEB.

ART. 2.—The object and purpose of said organization shall be to promote the general welfare of the city and county in which said club is situated; to promote enterprises of all kinds beneficial to said city and county; to encourage manufacturing and immigration, and to combine the business, stock raising and farming industries of said town and county into a community of interests for the development, progress and well being thereof.

ART. 3.—The officers of the organization shall consist of a President, two Vice Presidents, a Secretary, an Assistant Secretary, and Treasurer, whose duties shall be the usual duties devolving upon said officers in like bodies, provided that in the absence of the president or secretary, a fit second officer shall act in his stead. Each of said officers shall act in his head office for the term of one year and until successors are elected and qualified.

ART. 4.—Said organization shall elect from its membership an executive committee of five, two of whom shall hold said office for one year, two for two years, and one for three years. The duties of said executive committee shall be to promote enterprises and manage the same; to inquire into and look after the interests of the town and county contiguous thereto, and to combine the same way to act as a promoter of business for said organization.

ART. 5.—Membership in this organization shall be contingent upon the by-laws governing the same and the number of votes cast by said members shall be governed and regulated by the by-laws thereof. Provided that any member of said organization shall be free to discuss any proposition pending before said club, subject to the usual rules governing debate.

ART. 6.—This constitution may be amended, altered or changed upon notice of said proposed amendment, alteration or change being given in open meeting at the regular meeting proceeding the vote on said change or amendment by a majority vote of said members, as provided by said by-laws.

BY LAWS

ARTICLE 1.—The regular meeting of this club shall be the first Wednesday of each calendar month, at the hour of 7:30 p. m.

ART. 2.—The place of meeting shall be in the city of Broken Bow, Nebraska, and the business of said club shall be transacted at a regular meeting of said club.

ART. 3.—The officers of said club shall be elected by ballot, with or without nomination, and shall hold their respective offices for the term of one year.

ART. 4.—Any persons desiring to join said club shall pay a membership fee of \$1.00, and no one shall be eligible to vote or hold office or address the meeting of said club until said membership fee has been paid, provided said club may invite any one to address said meeting, whether a member thereof or not.

ART. 5.—The right of franchise in said organization shall be dependent upon the payment of the membership fee, herein fixed at one dollar, and each member of said club shall be entitled to cast one vote on any proposition before said club including the election of officers of said organization for each one dollar paid by such member into the treasury of said organization.

ART. 6.—The executive committee of this club shall have the power to appoint any sub-committee if they deem it expedient and in the interests of this organization so to do, to investigate and report upon any business or commercial proposition coming before the club, or any committee. Said sub-committee, when so appointed, shall report to the executive committee, and the same shall be laid before the club at its regular meeting by said executive committee.

ART. 7.—All propositions which contemplate the payment of money shall have the sanction of the executive committee in writing. Said committee shall keep an accurate account of the disbursement of monies authorized by it, and report the same to said club in open meeting.

ART. 8.—The treasurer of said organization shall pay out monies upon the check or warrant of said club, signed by the president and secretary and by no other persons, and shall render an account of monies disbursed on the club, with the warrants for payment exhibited and attached to such report.

ART. 9.—No officer of this club shall receive any salary or compensation for services as such officer, but said organization shall pay his just expenses, if any, upon the recommendation of the executive committee.

ART. 10.—The executive committee may appoint various standing sub-committees from time to time as they deem advisable to facilitate the business and object of the organization. Said standing committees shall be reported to the secretary and read in open session for the general endorsement of said club.

ART. 11.—The executive committee is empowered to fill all vacancies which may occur in the officers of said organization.

ART. 12.—These by-laws may be amended or repealed at any regular meeting of said organization by a majority vote of all members thereof.
