A Railroad Valentine.

On February 14 the Burlington railroad sent an unusual valentine to the Northern Pacific railroad at Billings, Montana. It was in the form of two heavy trains carrying 566 passengers for points in the Northwest. This was the first of the Tuesday excursions attracted by the low rates.
