Articles of Incorporation of the Anselmo Roller Mill and Elevator Company.

Know All Men by These Presents: That we, Frank B. Andrews and James Lindly, all of Custer County, in the State of Nebraska, do hereby certify that we have for the purpose of forming and becoming a corporation under the laws of the State of Nebraska, for the transaction of the business hereinafter described.

First. The name of this Corporation shall be the Anselmo Mill and Elevator Company, and the principal place of business of said Corporation shall be in Anselmo, in the County of Custer and State of Nebraska.

Second.
